## SIMPLE STEPS TO READING THE BIBLE FOR YOURSELF

No doubt you have heard pastors including myself admonish you to read your Bible. We all know we should read the Bible, but a 2021 Barna Group study showed only 34% of Christians surveyed read their Bible once a week or more. Paul wrote to Timothy, "All Scripture is Godbreathed and is useful for teaching, rebuking, correcting and training in righteousness, so that the servant of God may be thoroughly equipped for every good work" (2 Timothy 3:16-17). So, not only do we know we should read the Bible, but we also need to read the Bible to live out our faith.

Ok, rather than take you on a guilt trip, I'd like to share a few pointers on how to read your Bible, even if you've never done so before.

#### 1. Pray.

Never forget the Bible is God's Holy Word and he is our very best teaching. Do not presume to read the Bible without asking him to teach you.

#### 2. Get a good translation.

When I was a child, I was taught from the King James Version of the Bible. The KJV is still a good translation, but its language is a bit dated and difficult

to read for many. The Pew Bibles at First Congregational Church are the New International Translation, which was chosen a few years ago because it is easier to read. This is also the translation I use in each week's sermon. We have the luxury in the present age of dozens of print and electronic versions of the Bible. In addition to the two already mentioned I

suggest the New American Standard Version or the Christian Standard Bible as possibilities. The point is, get a translation of the Bible that you will read and understand. While we are on the subject, most reliable chronological, this aptranslations come in a Study Bible format, which means they include helpful tools like footnotes, commentary, maps, charts, and cross-references that will enhance your understanding. If you intend to purchase a new Bible, a Study Bible is an excellent option.

3. Read Chronologically.

The order of the 66 books in your Bible is organized by genre, not chronologically, and this can sometimes be confusing for some. A chronological approach will help you keep people and events straight as you read. If you wish to read the whole Bible chronologically start in the Old Testament with Genesis

through Job, followed by the prophetic books, Isaiah through Malachi. Finish the Old Testament with the poetic and wisdom literature, Psalms through Song of Songs. While not precisely proach will give you a better historical understanding. From there you can move to the Gospels in the New Testament, Matthew through John, before reading the history in the Book of Acts. After that read the epistles, Romans through Jude, and finish with the Book of Revelation. This approach will give you a better understanding of the thread that goes through Scripture from Genesis to Revelation.

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#### 4. Read Large Portions.

A devotional approach to Scripture focuses on one verse or a short passage and can be helpful and encouraging. This approach certainly has value and I encourage you to have a regular time of prayer and devotional reading. However, engaging in longer passages will give you a contextual understanding that gives you a grasp of the interconnectedness of various passages and stories. Many books of the Bible can be read in one setting, which leads to a better understand-

#### 5. Join a Group Bible Study.

While you should read the Bible for yourself, a group setting allows for shared insights and perspec- word but does not do what tives, as well as mutual sup- it says is like someone who port on the journey of faith. In addition, it fosters a sense of community and the encouragement of being part of a larger body of believers. So, the best ap-

proach is reading the Bible for yourself while also participating in a group study on a regular basis. Currently, FCC offers Wednesday Nite LIVE(stream) an online group study that begins at 7:00pm and lasts about an hour on Facebook and YouTube. We invite you to join in!

#### 6. Take Notes.

Any serious study on any subject is greatly enhanced by taking notes. Not only does note taking secure valuable information, but it also enhances comprehension through the act of writing things down. Find a notebook, a journal, or take notes on a smart phone through text or audibly. If you are going to invest your valuable time in Bible study (and I hope you will) it makes sense to retain and apply what you learn.

#### 7. Ask Questions.

Sometimes we forget, God isn't afraid of questions. He welcomes them! Jesus was open and welcomed questions while he taught. If you come across something you do not understand in Scripture, I invite and encourage your questions. If I don't know the answer – and sometimes I don't – I will work with you to find it.

#### 8. Focus on Application.

James wrote, "Do not merely listen to (or read) the word, and so deceive yourselves. Do what it says. Anyone who listens to the looks at his face in a mirror and, after looking at himself, goes away and immediately forgets what he looks like. But whoever looks intently into the per-

fect law that gives freedom and continues in it—not forgetting what they have *heard but doing it—they* will be blessed in what they do" (James 1:22-25). In other words, the teachings of Scripture are meant to be lived, not just read. Reading and comprehending biblical truth is very important, but the real value lies application to our daily lives, transforming our thoughts,

attitudes, and actions, and becoming more like Jesus. So, when you read your Bible ask yourself, "How can I make this part of my life? How can I be more like Jesus?"

#### 9. Be Persistent.

The folks from the Nike shoe company got it right, "Just Do It." Read your Bible. Because you are human you may grow weary or discouraged as you read and

there will be days when you don't feel you get anything from the practice. Keep at it. This is a lifelong pursuit, a marathon, not a sprint. Keep praying and keep reading. God will bless you


